For the last 29 years, the Pennsylvania Lions have organized an All-State Band to accompany the PA Lions to the annual State and International Conventions. A few weeks ago at the State Council meeting in Harrisburg a very important decision was made by the Council of Governors.

The decision was for the band to not participate in Seattle, the site of the 2011 International Convention, and instead save the money and go to Bussan, Korea for the 2012 International Convention June 22-26, 2012.

There is a tremendous expense to do Seattle alone and we cannot afford to do both. We in Pennsylvania are honored to have Past International Director Dr. Harold Ott as a candidate for second vice-president of Lions Clubs International and his candidacy would be declared at Bussan. We should be there for this momentous event and help to show our support for PID Ott.

This venture will be a large undertaking with finances as well as logistics with all having passports and handling instruments, etc. I would hope that all of you would consider participating in this awesome event. We will be taking a smaller group limited to 80 performers and 20 chaperones to help with the financial situation. We will do all we can to limit the fee for this event so all can afford going.

The schedule then would be not go to Germany in 2013 but go to Toronto in 2014 with a full band of 120 plus performers and the normal number of chaperones. PID Ott would become International President at this convention. We then have Hawaii the next year. Wow! We have so many wonderful opportunities to play great music and learn about Lionism in the future.

I hope this helps everyone plan their summers for a while. Several phone calls have come my way asking about dates for the Lion Band and thus the reason for this letter.

Please remember we will have the State Lions Convention each year also. This spring we will be in Cranberry Township, Pa. on May 20-21, 2011. All lodging and meal expenses are covered by the PA lions while at the convention. Students need only



provide transportation to and from the convention site.

For students from areas in the East that would contribute to the success of the Band, the Lions will charter a bus having several stops. This will bring students to and from the convention. Remember we normally limit the State Band to 80 performers so apply ASAP so we can work on the music and instru

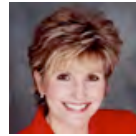
